What would be your priority after getting married: your career or raising a family?





Chart 2: Ideal, intended and actual number of children indicated by married respondents

Chart 8: Breakdown of single respondents by relationship status




Chart 9: Top 5 reasons for not dating, among single respondents who are not currently dating

Which of these reasons apply to you?




Chart 10: How single respondents, who are currently dating, met their partner




Chart 11: Single respondents' level of comfort with ways to meet a potential partner

The following are some ways by which singles may meet their potential partners. Which of these are you comfortable with? (Proportion who indicated "very comfortable")


